What is OPAT?

Outpatient parenteral antibiotic therapy (OPAT) allows you to have intravenous antibiotics at home or in an outpatient setting. It is a safe and cost-effective alternative to inpatient care.

We provide a continuation of antimicrobial treatment when patients are medically fit for discharge and no longer require hospitalisation.

Patients can be referred to OPAT after being reviewed by our Infectious Diseases physicians.

Our services

Clinic hours for antibiotics administration are from 8.30am to 12.30pm daily.

We provide the following clinical services:

- Weekly blood tests and consultations with one of our OPAT/ Infectious Diseases doctors.
- Patient and family education on how to care for your vascular access device at home.
- Home Caregiver Administration training (Self-OPAT) for the administration of intravenous antibiotics via 24-hour or 1-hour infusor.
 - Home administration is allowed to commence only after patient/caregiver is assessed as competent
 - Patients are required to attend the clinic 2 3 times a week
 - Patient education materials are provided for reference
 - A 24-hour hotline is available to provide support for patients/caregivers in times of emergency

How will you receive your antibiotics?

Via infusion (drip)

- Given daily in OPAT by nurses
- Takes about 45 minutes to complete

Via 24-hour infusor

- Patients will have to carry an infusor bottle with them for 24 hours
- Daily change of infusor bottle by OPAT nurses or main caregiver at home

Via one-hour infusor

- Small balloon containing the prescribed antibiotic
- Takes about one hour to administer
- Can be administered by OPAT nurses or main caregiver at home

Things to note

If you experience any of the following symptoms, please inform our staff at OPAT as soon as possible.

- Raised temperature (fever) above 37.5°C
- Feeling hot/cold, shivering or shaking
- Dizziness or feeling generally unwell
- Facial swelling or body rash
- Nausea, vomiting or diarrhoea
- Redness, pain, swelling or discharge around your vascular access device
